Free Flu jabs this Autumn

Influenza can be a killer. There are likely to be up to 30 million free flu vaccines in 2020.

This year, the Government has extended the free jab to those aged 50 and over, children up to Year 7 at school, pregnant women, and those with conditions which make them more vulnerable to the virus. Frontline health and social care workers are also eligible to receive the flu vaccine.

When is the NHS flu vaccine available?

Availability will be starting from the beginning of October through to the end of January. You can arrange an appointment with your GP, local pharmacy or for pregnant women, your midwife may offer the jab.

If you are eligible, then it is important you get yourself the vaccine jab. With the threat of Covid-19 this winter it is more important than ever to make sure those who are most vulnerable are protected from the flu.

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Houseproud Pledge

BHT are looking into signing up for The Houseproud Pledge.

This is a scheme that all social housing providers can sign up to, to demonstrate their commitment to LGBTQ+ resident equality and support. Research has shown that a third of LGBTQ+ residents felt unsafe and that they felt their landlord unable to deal effectively with issues like harassment.

Health data is information collected by the NHS. It is used to provide care, and sometimes also for research to improve care for others. However, there are ways of David Chaffey, Director of BHT Housing Services said: 'We want to lead by example in ensuring that every LGBTQ+ resident feels at home in a BHT home. We look forward to working with residents, allies and partners across the organisation and the wider housing sector.'

Choir with No Name is a charity offering a choir for people with life experience of homelessness.

Since 2018 we have been singing our hearts out at rehearsals, leading to some sensational gigs. Last year we had amazing Christmas gigs at Brighton Dome and Cadogan Hall in London.

During the lockdown we stopped rehearsals, but we ran a 'virtual choir' weekly via Zoom as well as keeping in touch with our choir members.

But now, some exciting news...

Government guidelines have now declared that singing is no worse than talking loudly - so we decided to move outside while the weather is still warm enough. On Monday 7th September we held our first rehearsal in



person – but outside, at Preston Park. There is strict social distancing and clear rules to ensure we are not breaking government guidelines.

How long will we be doing this?

We're already looking into whether we can safely move indoors during winter. However, if there is another lockdown locally we will of course transition back online.

BHT Digital Champions – Help Your Community get Online.

The COVID crisis has meant that digital inclusion has become a necessity. But it isn't easy for everyoneaccording to the 2019 Lloyds Consumer Digital Index, 22% of UK adults (11.9m people) are classified as not having the Essential Digital Skills needed for day-to-day life. Amongst vulnerable groups, the figure is even higher- 93% of UK adults over 70 years old are effectively digitally excluded.

If you would like to share your knowledge and support other tenants to get online, you could volunteer to be a digital champion. Being a digital champion is about encouraging others to understand the benefits of being online and how to connect in this way.

You don't need to be a technical expert, you simply need to have a bit of spare time, have a few basic digital skills, and be passionate about helping others.

Louise Knight's Sunday roast fests and how she's coping in the lockdown

Louise is a BHT tenant living at Cavendish House, Eastbourne. Here she tells us of her experience of living through COVID 19.

I'm coping OK I guess – though I watched a lot of TV! I care for another lady and we 'did' the lockdown together. It was good to have some company. I think I may well have gone stir crazy otherwise.

However, I did go out - I like to keep active, and I went for walks daily, e.g. prescriptions and provisions.

You can help anyone – family, friends, neighbours. And you can help tenants on any number of basic computer skills. For instance, managing their BHT MyTenancy online account, internet banking, using social media, shopping online – anything you want really.

Louise's Sunday Roast Fests



The BHT Tenant Pet Policy Panel

BHT accepts that some tenants want to keep a pet. We acknowledge that keeping pets can offer significant health and well-being benefits to their owners.

However, irresponsible pet ownership can cause a nuisance to other tenants and staff, as well as suffering for the animal(s).

Working with a group of tenants who are passionate about animal welfare, BHT has developed an official Pet Policy for tenants. The panel met online with Penny Laycock (Housing Services Manager) and Alasdair Tenquist to produce a clear policy. We wanted a document which would offer both clear guidance to tenants for pet safety and appropriate care, and also the safety of others who may be adversely affected by them.

'I found being involved worthwhile as I'm so passionate about animal welfare and my community.' Samantha, Panel member a BHT tenant who goes out their way to help others, someone who shows kindness and consideration.

The winner will be selected by representatives from a Good Neighbour Selection Panel made up of tenants and Housing Services staff. The winner will receive £50 worth of vouchers and a commemorative certificate. We would also like the winner to be featured in a press release on the award and to highlight why they won it.

In particular, the 'Pet Request and Welfare Form' now acts as a kind of pet 'passport', containing all the necessary information about the pet and the owner so that any issues can be rapidly and effectively dealt with.


'I think the good 'passport' data will highlight poorly treated animals or people who may need a hand in some direction with control of their pet.' Panel member

Building works recommence at BHT

Bonnie Bird, Building and Maintenance Surveyor for BHT, tells us what has been happening at BHT properties.

We have faced some difficult times this year with the restrictions of lockdown, lack of materials and uprising costs due to Covid-19. However, we're pleased to have completed the replacement of windows and further external works to Shanklin Court Brighton, which will help to retain heat and aid airflow in the properties – and has given it an overdue face-lift. 65-67 Springfield Road has also had an external property makeover with new windows and looks fantastic. Tenants of the completed projects were delighted with the results. Veronica, a tenant at Shanklin Court, said:

'They're lovely! So much easier to use than the old heavy wooden windows, most of which were dilapidated, warped and difficult to open.'

Warm Home Discount Applications now open

If you are eligible, you could get £140 off your electricity bill for winter 2020 to 2021 under the Government funded Warm Home Discount Scheme.

Some Warm Home Discount applications open already.

Applications are invited from low-income and vulnerable households. The scheme opens officially on October 12th 2020. However, some suppliers are open for applications. If you're with E.ON, Npower, Sainsburys Energy, or Utility Warehouse then you can contact them now to apply.

You qualify if:

- you get the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit – the 'core group'
- if you're on a low income and meet your energy supplier's criteria for the scheme known as the 'broader group'.

Ongoing external works at Marine Parade are hopefully looking to be completed by the end of October – if the weather behaves itself. We are spending in the region of £330,000 to improve the external property, replacing the front balconies, repairing windows or fitting replacements, a new fire escape walkway at the rear building, new roofs, parapet walls, re-decoration, and steel works to the structure of the bay windows.

We think that the new windows have created a much brighter, more comfortable and more attractive environment for our tenants. We hope they enjoy them!


Free Fire Safety Assessments for your home

Are you sure you are safe from fire – and would you know what to do in the event of a fire? And how risky is your property? As a result of COVID-19, the fire service have temporarily changed how they deliver their home safety visits to the community.

They now carry out special virtual visits over the phone where they talk to you about the fire risk in your home. They will then send you relevant information, and FREE smoke alarms to fit yourself (if you need them). In special circumstances the Fire Service can fit them for you.

Remember, you should test your smoke alarms regularly, at least once a month, and have one on each floor.


