Introducing Mary Stevens and the Environment Strategy




In April, I joined BHT Sussex as Environmental Officer. I am enjoying working with colleagues across the trust and looking at strategies to reduce our environmental impact.

The judges had a wonderful day chatting with our green-fingered tenants, and were all blown away by the efforts, flair and imagination our tenants had put into each of their gardens.

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


Before comparison... Debbie has transformed this garden from a pile of rubble to the urban wonderland it is now.

Charlie's Spiced Pumpkin Soup

A seasonal dish to celebrate Halloween and a great winter warmer as the longer nights approach.

Ingredients – 4/6 Servings

2 tbsp olive oil
3/4 knobs butter
2 onions peeled and chopped
1 litre hot vegetable or chicken stock
1 tsp mild curry powder
1 tsp ground ginger or finely chopped fresh ginger
1.5 kg pumpkin or butternut squash peeled
and cut into biggish pieces
2 apples cored and quartered with skin on
1 tsp coriander powder or a handful of chopped leaves
Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

The Blake Court Residents' Association

'It is great having a tenancy association because we can now talk things through with our landlords as a group rather than each individual repeating the same issues.' **Steven Devote, TA member**

Derek, BHT Sussex tenant, is Chair of the Blake Court Tenants' Association (BCTA) in Brighton and tells us about the Association's journey so far:

'Between us, tenants of Blake Court and BHT Sussex we have been able to start a Tenants' Association. We were grateful for the assistance of Alasdair (Involvement Officer) and Kiri (Housing Officer). Our aim with BCTA, is to work with BHT Sussex to get things done in a timely manner, things that need to be brought to BHT Sussex's attention as well as trying to save money for BHT Sussex, as if they are not aware of a problem it can degenerate and end up costing more to fix.

We experienced a little resistance at first, as some tenants don't want to be involved either due to lack of trust or medical reasons. However, most think it's a great idea and

- Heat a large saucepan with the olive oil and butter, add the ginger and a generous pinch of salt and pepper. Stir well, then add the stock, curry powder, sugar and coriander. Bring to the boil then turn off the heat and let it infuse.
- Put the pumpkin, onions and apple into a roasting tin and bake in a pre-heated oven 200c for about an hour, turn halfway through cooking and add a little more oil to prevent it from scorching too quickly.
- Put the roasted pumpkin, onions and apple in a food processor or liquidiser until smooth. Return the soup to the pan to reheat. Taste and adjust the seasoning. Ladle the soup into warm bowls and serve with fresh bread. Enjoy!
- After the Halloween celebrations this is a great tasty way to use up all the apples and pumpkin that is left over.

Call Out: Become a Green Inspector

Are your gardens important to you? Well-kept and trimmed gardens are beautifully calming and positively enhance people's mood.

We at BHT Sussex want to make sure that your garden is in the best shape it can be. To do that we need your help, by opting to be a BHT Sussex Green Inspector.

As a Green Inspector you are the 'eyes and ears' for BHT Sussex Housing Services. You let us know how well our gardening contractors are doing their job. It's simple to do. We tell you when your contractor is due to visit. You then look round the grounds as soon as possible after they have visited and use a simple online form to rate their performance against 5 criteria: grass cutting, shrub beds, hedges, paved areas and weeds. There's a simple selection grade of 1-3 for each of the 5 questions and the option to upload a photo.

If you'd prefer to fill it in by hand we will provide you with hard copies of the Green Inspector's recording form along with stamped addressed envelopes for you to return it to me.

With your help, together we can maintain all our gardens to a standard that improves every resident's well-being.

Help keeping warm this winter

It's nearly the time when we think about turning the heating on – and prices to keep us warm are set to increase. Help is available from the Government through the Warm Home Discount scheme, which offers £140 off your electricity bill for winter 2021-2022. If you receive a means tested benefit you may be eligible. You will need to apply for the discount through your energy supplier, so first check if they offer it. If eligible, you will receive a one-off discount from your bill between October-March. The scheme opens on October 18th. If you receive a cold weather payment or Winter Fuel Payment, this will not be affected.

There are other ways you can keep your home warm. If you are in Brighton & Hove, the BH Energy Services Co-op can offer advice on switching tariffs to get the best deal, as well as help applying for the Warm Homes Discount. They can also provide advice about installing free energy saving measures in your home. If you are in Mid Sussex see <u>Mid Sussex</u> District Council - West Sussex Energy for available advice.

Watching our waste

As part of our BHT Sussex Environment Strategy we're watching our waste – and want to reduce it as far as possible. During lockdowns littering and dumping of waste increased. Fly-tipping is the illegal dumping of waste, items or materials and is a criminal offence. Common examples include leaving household appliances and furniture by communal bins; leaving items on the pavement for others to take; dumping rubbish or building materials in green spaces.

If you see fly-tipped waste on public land, report it to your local council who will remove it. Waste electrical items contain toxic metals (everything from phones to TVs and fridges), so must be safely disposed of. Local councils have different systems for collection and disposal, so if not sure what to do with, for example, an old phone, kettle or TV that no longer works, check with your council. If you have large items to get rid of, and can't take it to a local authority waste site yourself, make sure you use a licensed waste collector to ensure its properly disposed of – if it's dumped you could risk a fine.

If you have any items that are still usable – try and avoid throwing them away. The Freegle online network is a great way to ensure items are reused: <u>Freegle ilovefreegle.org</u>

Fire Safety and prevention in Your Home – David Reid, BHT Sussex

BHT Sussex takes its responsibility for fire safety in its properties extremely seriously.

We ensure suitable systems are in place to ensure the alarm is raised in the event of any fire incident. There are however steps that you, as a tenant can take that will increase your safety in the event of an incident occurring.

- Know your evacuation plan look for notices indicating fire call/assembly points and advising what to do in the event of an alarm sounding.
- Know the fire evacuation routes available look out for the signs indicating these.
- Inform your Housing Officer if you need assistance in evacuating the building, so they can advise the emergency services accordingly.
- Keep passageways clear.
- Test your smoke alarms weekly. Do not interfere with or remove smoke detectors.

Complaints: How do they work?

We sometimes get questions about how the BHT Sussex Complaints Procedure works.

In this article, Bonnie Bird, BHT Sussex Building and Maintenance Surveyor, gives you an example of the process in relation to a complaint about a tenant's water bills.

We received a complaint from a tenant regarding her high water bills. She requested that we investigated as she was convinced there was a leak in a pipe. However,

- Allow fire safety companies to complete statutory fire safety checks
- If you wish to discuss any aspect of fire safety, please contact your Housing Officer.

Fire Prevention


Listed below are the most common causes of house fires and steps you can take to help prevent them occurring:

- Appliances Switch off appliances at night and only buy appliances from trustworthy sources.
- Kitchen Fires Take extra care when cooking with oil and never leave it unattended.
- Electrical sockets Do not use adapters to overload sockets and have no more than one plug in each socket.
- Cigarettes and candles Stub out cigarettes properly and dispose of them appropriately. Make sure candles are in a fireproof holder and don't light them near children, pets, curtains, or other fabric.
- Rubbish Put all rubbish in the bins provided, nowhere else.
- Gas appliances If you have a gas boiler, make sure BHT Sussex' gas maintenance supplier is given access to test it when required.

BHT Sussex sent out plumbers on two separate occasions to investigate, and in both cases they found no leaks. Southern Water were also called. They investigated and found nothing wrong with the meter or any leaks on pipework. Upon further investigation, the number of people living in the property had increased by 2 people. Clearly, this would increase the water bill. Unfortunately, during the period of the complaint, regular payments of bills hadn't been kept up, and the tenant had fallen into debt.

After we contacted the tenant with our findings, she was not happy and proceeded to raise the complaint to Stage 2. Another plumber was sent out, and further investigation into the bills and usage again proved the amount was typical of 3 people in the property. We again concluded no further action would be taken.


